



Why should you care?

Youth with emotional and behavioral disabilities (EBD):

- have the worst graduation rate of all students with disabilities. Nationally, only 40% of students with EBD graduate from high school, compared to the national average of 76%.
- are three times as likely as other students to be arrested before leaving school.
- are twice as likely as students with other disabilities (e.g. developmental or learning) to be living in a correctional facility, halfway house, drug treatment center, or on the street after leaving school.
- are twice as likely as students with other disabilities to become teenage mothers.

Untreated mental health issues may lead to poor school performance, school dropout, strained relationships, involvement with the child welfare or juvenile justice systems, substance abuse, and engagement in risky sexual behaviors.

Kelsey Carroll has dealt with tremendous challenges in her life. She considered dropping out of school and was a likely candidate for the juvenile justice system. However, through intensive self-directed planning and wraparound

supports, Kelsey began the transformation to a motivated, self-confident young woman. Kelsey, now 22, began college in January 2013 and is studying psychology toward a career as a school counselor.
